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## Day 1 – Seattle, WA

Begin your journey in the heart of Seattle at Pike Place Market, where the city wakes up among the scent of fresh coffee, cut flowers, and just-baked pastries. Spend the morning weaving through its historic arcades, watching fishmongers at work, and browsing artisan stalls. At the same time, you enjoy breakfast with views over Elliott Bay from a café such as Lowell's or Le Panier. From here, wander down to the waterfront to stroll the piers, watch ferries gliding across Puget Sound, and take in distant views of the Olympic range. Continue to the Seattle Center, home to the Space Needle, Chihuly Garden and Glass, and the Museum of Pop Culture, where you can balance skyline views with time among art and interactive exhibits.

In the afternoon, follow the shoreline north to Olympic Sculpture Park for a walk among large-scale outdoor artworks set above the water, then drive up to Kerry Park for a classic panorama of the city backed by Mount Rainier when the air is clear. Later, head east to Woodinville Wine Country, where tasting rooms and winery estates sit among leafy river valleys and vineyard slopes; sample Washington wines at places like Chateau Ste. Michelle or DeLille Cellars before returning to the city. Evening brings a chance to savor Pacific Northwest flavors at restaurants near the market or along the downtown waterfront. The Pink Door or Cafe Campagne are both atmospheric options, before you cap the day at an overlook such as Queen Anne Boulevard or Gas Works Park, watching the skyline glow above the bay.

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## Day 2 – Seattle, WA → Bainbridge Island, WA → Port Angeles, WA

Begin with a short ferry crossing from downtown Seattle to **Bainbridge Island**, a smooth glide across the Sound that offers changing perspectives of the skyline and snow-tipped peaks. On arrival in Winslow, wander the compact town center filled with galleries, cafés, and the Bainbridge Island Museum of Art, or visit the **Bloedel Reserve**, where manicured gardens blend into quiet woodland and reflective ponds. Continue north through Poulsbo, known for its Scandinavian-inspired storefronts, bakeries, and sheltered harbor, then through historic Port Gamble, with its preserved mill town architecture and antique shops. Pause in **Port Ludlow** to walk the marina, follow the short Ludlow Falls trail, or linger over lunch at the Fireside Restaurant, which looks out onto a calm, boat-filled inlet.

After lunch, your route traces the edge of inlets and tree-covered ridges toward **Port Angeles**, where the Olympic Discovery Trail hugs the shoreline and the harbor front is lined with piers and public art. Stop at the Olympic National Park Visitor Center for a quick orientation before driving the winding road up to **Hurricane Ridge**, climbing from coastal lowlands to open high country. At the top, meadows and subalpine slopes open to sweeping views of jagged peaks and glacier-carved valleys, with short, paved paths like Big Meadow and Cirque Rim offering easy ways to stretch your legs in the thin, crisp air. Return to Port Angeles in the evening to stroll the waterfront promenade and enjoy dinner in a harbor-view restaurant before settling in for the night.

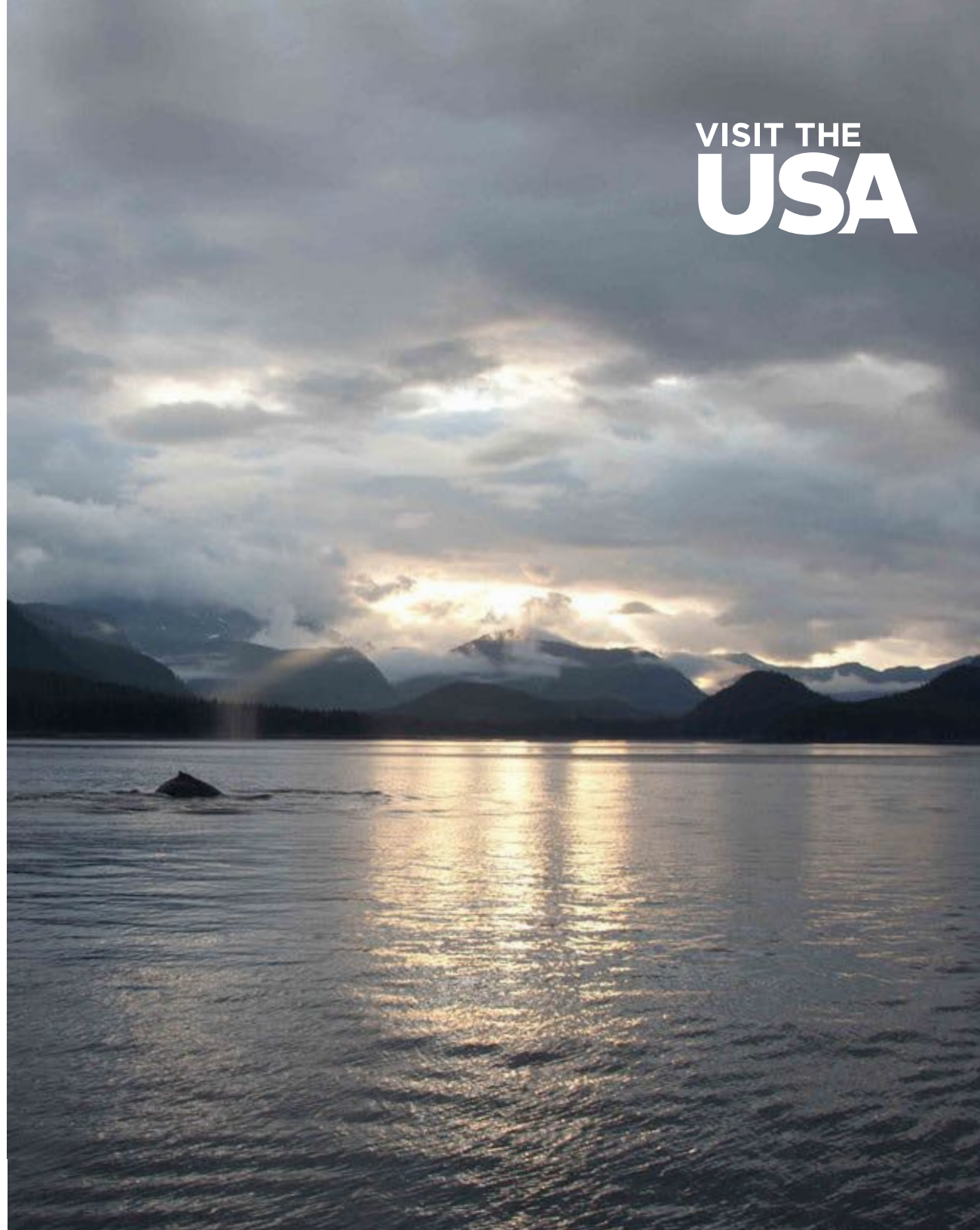
## Day 3 – Port Angeles, WA → Quinault Rain Forest, WA → Seabrook, WA

Depart **Port Angeles** and follow Highway 101 southwest along the shores of **Lake Crescent**, where forested slopes descend directly into deep blue water and the road winds through the heart of **Olympic National Park**. As the drive continues south, the air cools and thickens with moisture, marking the transition into temperate rainforest. A detour into the **Hoh Rain Forest** allows time to walk the **Hall of Mosses Nature Trail** and explore the **Spruce Burl Trailhead**, where towering **Sitka spruce** and moss-draped maples create a hushed, cathedral-like landscape. Rejoining Highway 101, the scenery gradually opens as the route approaches the outer Pacific coast, bringing glimpses of sea stacks, driftwood-lined beaches, and salt air at **Kalaloch**, home to the massive **Kalaloch Big Cedar** and the iconic **Tree of Life** poised above a coastal bluff.

Turning inland toward the **Quinault Valley**, the forest grows even denser and more primeval. Walk among giant trees at the **Ancient Groves Main Trailhead**, then visit the **World's Largest Sitka Spruce**, an awe-inspiring reminder of the scale and longevity of this ecosystem. Just minutes away along South Shore Road, **Merriman Falls** spills dramatically beside the road, offering an easy and scenic pause before continuing south. The day concludes with a coastal drive to **Seabrook**, where a walkable oceanside village overlooks a broad sandy beach, providing a relaxed setting to unwind and watch the sun set over the Pacific after a full day immersed in Olympic National Park.

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## Day 4 – Seabrook, WA → Cannon Beach, OR

Leaving Seabrook, continue south along Washington's outer edge as dunes, cranberry bogs, and small fishing communities give way to long views of surf and sky. Drive onto the **Long Beach Peninsula**, pausing in Ocean Park and Long Beach to wander the deep, sandy strand, walk or bike the paved Discovery Trail behind the dunes, and visit the World Kite Museum. At the peninsula's southern tip, explore **Cape Disappointment State Park**, where forested headlands and cliffs frame the meeting of the Columbia River and the Pacific; the park's lighthouses and Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center provide a sense of history to match the dramatic scenery.

Cross the sweeping span of the **Astoria–Megler Bridge** into Oregon and the atmospheric port city of **Astoria**, with its Victorian houses perched on steep streets and a waterfront lined with converted cannery buildings. Climb to the Astoria Column for a spiral-staircase view over the river, hills, and sea, or visit the Columbia River Maritime Museum to learn about the "Graveyard of the Pacific." Then continue south on Highway 101, where forested headlands and small coves mark the way to **Ecola State Park**, a superb perch for views toward Haystack Rock and a string of offshore stacks. Descend into **Cannon Beach**, whose compact center of galleries, wine rooms, and cafés opens onto a vast, rugged, sandy expanse with Haystack Rock standing sentry just offshore.

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## Day 5 – Cannon Beach, OR → Dundee, OR (Willamette Valley) → Yachats, OR

Depart Cannon Beach and climb through the Coast Range, trading sea breezes for vine-covered slopes and patchwork farmland as you enter the renowned **Willamette Valley**. In and around **Dundee**, winery signposts line the hillsides; spend the late morning visiting a few tasting rooms and estates known for Pinot Noir and Chardonnay, where patios overlook rows of vines and, on clear days, distant mountain peaks. Pause for lunch at a local favorite, such as Red Hills Market, before turning your attention back to the Pacific.

The road south and west dips through tree-lined ravines and timber towns before rejoining Highway 101 near Lincoln City, where the route alternates between ocean overlooks, river mouths, and small harbors. Continue past Depoe Bay's rocky inlets and Newport's working docks, pausing at **Devils Punchbowl** or **Yaquina Head** for lighthouse views and tide pools crowded with anemones and sea stars. Arrive in **Yachats**, a compact, arts-minded town tucked between basalt ledges and the forested slopes of Cape Perpetua, where the sea tends to crash rather than lap. Spend the evening walking along the edge of the black rock shoreline, exploring galleries and cafés, or watching waves strike the volcanic formations as the light fades.

## Day 6 – Yachats, OR → Coos Bay, OR → Gold Beach, OR

Follow Highway 101 south through a stretch of scenery that alternates between cliff-top viewpoints and pocket harbors. Within a short drive of Yachats, you'll reach **Cape Perpetua Scenic Area**, where short trails lead to lookouts above rugged rock shelves and features like Thor's Well and Devil's Churn, where ocean swells funnel and crash dramatically. Continue past **Heceta Head Lighthouse** and the high bluffs near Florence to the vast **Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area**, where wind-sculpted sand rises in tall ridges above quiet lakes, pockets of pine, and the occasional off-highway vehicle.

South of the dunes, arrive in **Coos Bay**, a working port town with a small boardwalk, maritime history, and easy access to some of the coast's most dramatic promontories. Detour to **Shore Acres State Park**, where manicured gardens sit atop sheer cliffs and waves explode against rock shelves, and to **Cape Arago**, a headland with views of offshore rocks favored by sea lions. Continue toward **Bandon**, whose Old Town and offshore rock formations invite a quick stop, and then past **Cape Blanco**, the westernmost point in Oregon, where pastures meet wind-shaped bluffs. Finish your day in **Gold Beach**, a relaxed riverside community where the Rogue River slides between steep hills to join the open Pacific.

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## Day 7 – Gold Beach, OR → Redwood National & State Parks, CA → Eureka, CA

Depart Gold Beach and almost immediately enter the **Samuel H. Boardman State Scenic Corridor**, a stretch of Highway 101 that hugs rocky headlands and passes secluded coves. Short side paths lead to viewpoints such as **Arch Rock** and **Natural Bridges**, where sea arches, needle-shaped stacks, and jade-colored water create some of the most photographed scenes on this drive. Continue south through Brookings, the last Oregon town before the state line, then cross into California, where the landscape begins to shift from seaside bluffs to river valleys and the first stands of colossal conifers.

Near **Klamath**, head to the **Klamath River Overlook**, where the river's brown ribbon meets the open sea and, in season, whales may spout offshore. From there, continue into the heart of **Redwood National and State Parks**, following the **Newton B. Drury Scenic Parkway** through Prairie Creek Redwoods State Park, where the road threads between massive trunks and fern-filled understory. Stop for short walks, such as the Big Tree loop or Lady Bird Johnson Grove, to experience the hush of old-growth redwood stands, where light filters down in narrow beams. Arrive in **Eureka** by late afternoon and spend the evening exploring its Old Town district, ornate Victorian buildings, waterfront views, and a cluster of restaurants and wine bars that celebrate the region's maritime and logging heritage.

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## Day 8 – Eureka, CA → Humboldt Redwoods State Park, CA → Sonoma, CA

Leave Eureka and travel south along Highway 101, soon turning onto the **Avenue of the Giants**, a 31-mile byway that parallels the Eel River beneath some of the tallest trees on the planet. In **Humboldt Redwoods State Park**, pull over at **Founders Grove** or **Rockefeller Forest** for short trails that wander among massive trunks and moss-lined logs, with the river never far away. Picnic areas tucked along roads offer tranquil spots to pause and soak in the cathedral-like feel of these groves.

As you rejoin 101 and head south, the landscape gradually opens into rolling hills dotted with oaks and vineyards. Around **Hopland** and **Cloverdale**, low-key wineries and tasting rooms offer your first taste of inland wine country. Continue into Sonoma County and then east toward the town of **Sonoma**, where low stucco buildings and mission-era adobes encircle a leafy central plaza. Spend the late afternoon exploring **Sonoma State Historic Park**, dropping into art galleries and tasting rooms along the square, and, if time allows, visiting one of the nearby legacy wineries such as Buena Vista or Gundlach Bundschu before sitting down to dinner at a plaza restaurant like the girl & the fig or El Dorado Kitchen.

## Day 9 – Sonoma, CA → Napa, CA → Golden Gate Bridge, CA → San Francisco, CA

Depart Sonoma in the morning and drive east on Highway 12 into **Napa Valley**, passing vineyard-lined hills and small towns like Glen Ellen before joining Highway 29 or the Silverado Trail. Choose one or two wineries around Yountville, Oakville, or St. Helena to visit at a leisurely pace: many pair tastings with gardens, art collections, and sweeping valley views, making them destinations as much as tasting rooms. With planning, food lovers might consider lunch at **Bouchon Bistro** one of the valley's most celebrated restaurants.

After your time among vineyards, head west toward the **Marin Headlands**, where coastal hills rise above the entrance to San Francisco Bay. Pull into viewpoints such as Battery Spencer or Hawk Hill, where the **Golden Gate Bridge** unfurls below in its full span, with the city skyline, Alcatraz, and the East Bay beyond. Then cross the bridge into **San Francisco**, pausing at Vista Point if traffic allows, and make your way downtown. Spend the rest of the afternoon and evening exploring **Union Square's** shopping and galleries, or strolling the **Embarcadero**, with dinner at a classic like John's Grill or a contemporary spot near the waterfront.

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## Day 10 – San Francisco, CA

Devote your morning to some of San Francisco’s signature experiences: ride a cable car up through Nob Hill, clanging past historic hotels and ornate facades, then descend toward the bay through Chinatown or North Beach, depending on where you hop off. Continue to **Fisherman’s Wharf** and **Pier 39**, where you can see sea lions lounging on the docks, browse maritime exhibits, or catch a ferry to **Alcatraz Island** for an audio tour of the former prison and its sweeping harbor views.

After lunch, perhaps at the Ferry Building marketplace, with its cluster of artisan food stalls and wine bars, head west to the **Presidio**, a former military post now transformed into a national park with forested trails, scenic overlooks, and museums. From there, continue into **Golden Gate Park** to explore the de Young Museum, the California Academy of Sciences, the Japanese Tea Garden, or wander among meadows and lakes. In the evening, seek out a viewpoint such as **Coit Tower** or **Twin Peaks** for a final look over the patchwork of hills and neighborhoods before dinner downtown or along the Embarcadero, and perhaps a stroll past the illuminated Bay Bridge lights.

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## Day 11 – San Francisco, CA → Half Moon Bay, CA → 17-Mile Drive, CA → Monterey, CA

Leave the city by way of Highway 1, quickly trading urban neighborhoods for cliff-side vistas and fields of artichokes and pumpkins as you approach Half Moon Bay. Stop at Moss Beach or Montara State Beach for a short walk along windswept bluffs, then visit downtown **Half Moon Bay** to browse local galleries and cafés. A late-morning stop at Sam’s Chowder House or Barbara’s Fishtrap gives you the chance to enjoy chowder, seafood, and wide-open ocean views before you continue south.

From there, the road dips into redwood-lined ravines near Pescadero and emerges again at viewpoints above the water near Davenport and **Santa Cruz**, where the Beach Boardwalk and surf breaks lend a relaxed, lively feel. Continue around the curve of Monterey Bay toward **Pacific Grove** and **Pebble Beach**, entering the private **17-Mile Drive** loop. Take your time along this storied section, pausing at lookouts such as Spanish Bay, Bird Rock, and the Lone Cypress, where wave-pounded rocks, cypress groves, and carefully manicured fairways create a distinctive landscape. Arrive in **Monterey** by late afternoon and explore Cannery Row’s converted canneries, the historic waterfront, or the acclaimed Monterey Bay Aquarium before settling into one of the town’s bayside restaurants for the evening.

**Day 12 – Monterey, CA →  
Carmel-by-the-Sea, CA →  
Big Sur, CA →  
Cambria/Hearst Castle, CA →  
Morro Bay, CA**

Start with a short drive to **Carmel-by-the-Sea**, where narrow streets lined with storybook cottages, galleries, and cafés lead down to a crescent of pale sand. Spend the morning exploring the village or walking along Carmel Beach with views toward Point Lobos before turning south onto Highway 1 into **Big Sur**. This stretch of road hugs sheer cliffs and clings to the edge of rugged mountains, passing **Point Lobos State Natural Reserve**, **Bixby Creek Bridge**, and redwood-lined canyons near Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park. Continue south to and make a stop at **Hearst Castle** in **San Simeon**, perched high above the surrounding ranchland. Join a guided tour to explore its lavish rooms, pools, and terraces, and enjoy sweeping views back toward the ocean and surrounding hills. Continue a short drive south to **Cambria**, where you can stroll the wooden boardwalk above Moonstone Beach, watching waves roll over sand scattered with polished stones and driftwood. From there, continue to the **Piedras Blancas Elephant Seal Rookery**, where hundreds of elephant seals gather seasonally on the sand, creating a remarkable spectacle of activity and sound.

The final leg brings you to **Morro Bay**, where the dramatic silhouette of Morro Rock rises from the harbor mouth, and fishing boats move quietly back and forth. Spend the evening strolling the waterfront promenade, browsing small shops and galleries, and watching sea otters and shorebirds in the sheltered bay.

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## Day 13 – Morro Bay, CA → Paso Robles, CA → San Luis Obispo, CA → Morro Bay, CA

Begin with a morning walk along Morro Bay's embarcadero as the sun rises over the hills and the fishing fleet heads out to sea. Leaving the ocean edge road behind, turn inland today to **Paso Robles**. Here, oak-draped hills and countless wineries create a relaxed wine country atmosphere; stop for a tasting or lunch around the town square. Begin your return by heading south and then east to **San Luis Obispo**, a vibrant college town with a historic mission, tree-shaded streets, and a lively downtown packed with boutiques and cafés. After wandering the center, perhaps stopping at a creek-side restaurant such as Novo or a popular spot like Flour House for an early dinner, then drive back to **Morro Bay** for a second night, watching the last light hit Morro Rock and the calm harbor.

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## Day 14 – Morro Bay, CA → Los Olivos & Solvang, CA → Santa Barbara, CA

Head south from Morro Bay, passing Pismo Beach’s dunes and the sheltered curve of **Avila Beach**, before turning inland into the **Santa Ynez Valley**. Here, rolling hills, scattered oaks, and long rows of vines replace open water, and tasting room signs dot the roadside. Arrive in **Solvang**, a Danish-inspired town where half-timbered facades, windmills, and flower boxes line the streets; bakeries and chocolate shops showcase Scandinavian-style treats.

A short drive away, **Los Olivos** offers a quieter, more intimate cluster of tasting rooms and galleries under broad shade trees, with wineries pouring Rhône blends, Pinot Noir, and more. Continue over **San Marcos Pass**, where pullouts offer expansive views of layered mountains and the shining Pacific beyond, and descend into **Santa Barbara**, a city defined by whitewashed walls, red-tile roofs, and palm-fringed shoreline. Visit **Old Mission Santa Barbara**, wander State Street and the Funk Zone’s galleries and urban tasting rooms, and finish with sunset on Stearns Wharf or a walk along the beachfront path as the sky colors behind the Channel Islands.

## Day 15 – Santa Barbara, CA → Los Angeles, CA

Begin your day with a stroll through **Shoreline Park** or along Santa Barbara's palm-lined waterfront, taking in views of sailboats and the distant islands. Then continue south through Carpinteria, where mellow strands meet avocado groves, and on to Ventura and Oxnard, where farmland stretches toward the sea and the Channel Islands hover on the horizon. As you merge onto Highway 1, the road begins to hug the base of the Santa Monica Mountains, with long arcs of sand on one side and chaparral-covered slopes on the other.

Entering **Malibu**, the scenery shifts to coves, dramatic bluffs, and hillside homes. Stop at **El Matador Beach** to descend to a pocket of golden sand framed by rock arches and sea caves, or head to the **Malibu Pier**, where Malibu Farm serves farm-driven dishes above gentle waves and surfers. Continue toward **Santa Monica**, where the famous pier, Ferris wheel, and Third Street Promenade mark the transition from laid-back shore to vibrant urban energy; if you wish, pause for a late-afternoon drink or early dinner at a restaurant like The Misfit or Tar & Roses. The final stretch takes you into **Los Angeles**, where freeways and palm-lined boulevards spread in all directions. Choose to end your day near downtown, Hollywood, or the Westside, depending on where you'd like to explore next.

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## Day 16 – Los Angeles, CA

Spend your final full day sampling some of Los Angeles' most emblematic neighborhoods. Begin by the water at **Venice Beach**, where the boardwalk hums with street performers, skaters, and murals. At the same time, the **Venice Canals** offer a calmer network of narrow waterways lined with bungalows and arched bridges. Continue a short distance to **Marina del Rey** for a more tranquil harbor scene, then drive inland to **Hollywood** to see the Walk of Fame, TCL Chinese Theatre, and Dolby Theatre, where the Academy Awards are held.

In the afternoon, wind your way up through **Griffith Park** to **Griffith Observatory**, a hilltop perch with sweeping views of downtown's skyline, the Hollywood Sign, and the Santa Monica Mountains. Later, head to **Beverly Hills** to stroll Rodeo Drive and the manicured streets nearby, then choose between an evening in West Hollywood along the **Sunset Strip** or in **Downtown / Arts District**, where standout restaurants like Bestia and Bavel serve some of the city's most talked-about food in converted industrial spaces. 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## Day 17 – Los Angeles, CA → San Diego, CA

Leave Los Angeles in the morning and turn the final stretch south into a scenic shoreline day by following **Highway 1** through Orange County's classic waterfront communities, including **Seal Beach, Huntington Beach, Newport Beach, Laguna Beach, and Dana Point**. A lovely breakfast stop is **The Beachcomber at Crystal Cove** in Newport Coast, where breakfast is served right on the sand, making it an easy, atmospheric pause before continuing down the coast. Afterward, a brief stop at **Heisler Park** in Laguna Beach adds bluff-top walking paths, gardens, and tide-pool views without taking too much time away from the drive.

Continue south into San Diego County, where Historic **Highway 101** links a string of beloved beach towns from **Oceanside to La Jolla**, offering a relaxed, memorable approach into the city. Upon a lunchtime arrival, **La Jolla Cove** makes an excellent first stop for a waterfront stroll, and from there you can choose between an afternoon in **Balboa Park**, with its museums, gardens, and landmark architecture, or make the **San Diego Zoo** your second option, since it is located right in Balboa Park. As the sun sets, enjoy dinner perched above San Diego Bay. **Top of the Market** pairs sweeping waterfront views with impeccably fresh seafood. A refined yet relaxed setting captures the essence of coastal San Diego in every bite and is a fitting finale to a journey that has traced river valleys, cliff-edged shorelines, redwood groves, and wine-growing landscapes all the way down the Pacific.
