Nature lovers and culinary explorers find delightful surprises in Orlando's quieter corners. Begin a tranquil morning with an exhilarating airboat ride skimming across Florida's lush, wild wetlands, spotting wildlife like graceful herons and lurking gators amidst the serene landscape. If tranquility beckons, kayak through the crystal-clear waters of Wekiwa Springs or stroll along boardwalk trails within lush botanical gardens alive with fluttering butterflies and basking turtles. After an active day outdoors, Orlando's diverse dining and nightlife scene warmly welcomes visitors, perhaps a lively evening at Café Tu Tu Tango, a tapas spot where local artists create masterpieces live amidst diners, or attending a whimsical dinner theater performance featuring medieval jousts or comedic antics. For adults seeking an intimate escape, hidden speakeasies or trendy craft breweries scattered across downtown offer the perfect nightcap, crafting unforgettable evenings infused with local flavor and spirited charm.

## BEYOND THE CITY

---

### **CRYSTAL RIVER, FLORIDA**

If you're craving a nature escape, Crystal River is where Old Florida charm meets wild adventure, and only ninety minutes from Orlando. The big highlight here is getting up close with manatees – this quiet Gulf Coast town is one of the few places where you can kayak or snorkel alongside gentle manatees in clear spring-fed waters. It's a thrill for all ages to glide over Three Sisters Springs, spotting those "sea cows" drifting under your kayak. Apart from manatees, the area's all about the outdoors: think airboat rides, fishing, or hiking through unspoiled wetlands. When hunger hits, swing by Cracker's Bar & Grill, a casual waterfront joint where you can dine on fresh grouper sandwiches and fried shrimp with a view of the marina. It's the kind of laid-back, come-as-you-are seafood spot where kids can marvel at pelicans hanging around the docks and grown-ups can relax with a cold drink.

### **ST. AUGUSTINE, FLORIDA**

For a mix of history and seaside fun, you can't beat a day trip two hours north of St. Augustine, the nation's oldest city. Walking through St. Augustine feels like stepping into a living museum that happens to have a beachy attitude. Stroll down the cobblestone lanes of the historic district, where Spanish colonial buildings now house quirky shops, ice cream parlors, and taverns. Kids and adults alike will be fascinated by the Castillo de San Marcos, a 17th-century stone fortress on the waterfront – the views of Matanzas Bay from atop the old fort walls are worth the visit alone. There's also an old-timey charm in attractions like the Pirate & Treasure Museum or just watching the horse-drawn carriages clip-clop by.

### **COCOA BEACH, FLORIDA**

When locals talk about a classic "beach day," Cocoa Beach is often the first place that comes to mind. Just an hour's drive east, this surf town is all about sun, sand, and riding the waves. The beach is wide and welcoming – ideal for everything from building sandcastles and playing frisbee with the kids to taking

a surf lesson (Cocoa Beach's rolling waves are perfect for beginners). Stroll along the iconic Cocoa Beach Pier, where you'll see fishermen casting lines and hear live music from the tiki bar at the end. You might even glimpse a rocket launch in the distance if your timing is right, since NASA's Kennedy Space Center is just up the coast. For lunch, grab a bite at one of the popular oceanfront hangouts to dine in your flip-flops. Enjoy a casual meal of fish tacos or a juicy burger while gazing at the Atlantic. After a lazy afternoon of swimming and maybe checking out the famous Ron Jon Surf Shop (a must-stop for any surfer at heart), return to the pier for sunset. Sip a cocktail with waves literally crashing beneath your feet and the sky turning shades of orange and pink, you'll understand why Cocoa Beach is an enduring favorite for locals and visitors alike.

### **ST. PETERSBURG, FLORIDA**

St. Petersburg (or "St. Pete" as locals call it) makes for a short two-and-a-half drive from Orlando, a day trip that's equal parts artsy city exploration and seaside chill. Once known as a retiree town, St. Pete has reinvented itself with a hip, youthful energy while keeping its retro-Florida charm. Take time wandering the walkable downtown: you can check out the murals that splash color on countless buildings, pop into local galleries and boutiques, or visit the famous Dalí Museum to be amazed by Salvador Dalí's surreal masterpieces (the building itself, with its giant glass bubble design, is a conversation piece). Don't miss strolling along the new St. Pete Pier, it's like a park that stretches into the bay, with sculptures, a splash pad for kids, and a pavilion where you might catch live music or an impromptu market. The pier's breeze and views of sailboats and the skyline make it a great spot to kick back. For a more sedate pace, you might relax in the shade at Vinoy Park or drive fifteen minutes over to St. Pete Beach for a quick beach stroll on powdery sand. As evening comes on, downtown St. Pete really shines. You'll find street music, trendy restaurants, and a warm, welcoming vibe. This city has a thriving craft beer scene and plenty of bars.
